<p><b>Language Arts:</b></p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>to think, talk and write about what they read in a variety of articles, books and other texts within the 2-3-complexity band</li> <li>to organize information, develop ideas, and support these ideas with facts, details, and reasons</li> </ul>	<p><b>Science:</b></p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>to demonstrate grade appropriate proficiency in developing and using models, planning, and carrying out investigations, analyzing and interpreting data, engage in argument and communicate information</li> </ul>
<p><b>Math:</b></p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>their concept of numbers and develop an understanding of fractions as number</li> <li>the concepts behind multiplication and division and apply problem-solving skills and strategies for multiplying and dividing numbers up to through 100 to solve word-problems</li> <li>to make connections between the concept of the area of a rectangle and multiplication and addition of whole numbers</li> </ul>	<p><b>Social Studies:</b></p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>about continuity and change</li> <li>about comparative studies of the neighborhood, cities, countries, and continents and core cultural and multicultural units</li> </ul>
<p><b>Technology:</b></p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>to master word processing skills and expand upon strategies for the safe use of computers</li> <li>to explore the similarities and differences between in-person and online communications</li> <li>how to write clear and respectful emails</li> <li>how they can build and strengthen positive online communication and communities</li> </ul>	<p><b>Physical Education:</b></p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>body conditioning, sports and dances from other countries</li> <li>standard physical education, teaching sports and other non-traditional approaches to physical education such as gymnastics, dance, yoga, and martial arts</li> <li>about nutrition</li> </ul>
<p><b>The Arts:</b>  <b>Music:</b></p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>increasingly complex and lengthy rhythm patterns and sequences</li> <li>a variety of music (classical, contemporary, jazz, and multicultural) and engage in discussion of the different musical genres</li> </ul>	<p><b>The Arts:</b>  <b>Theater:</b></p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>to perform brief improvisational scenes and develop lengthier performance pieces</li> <li>to speak and move in a manner suitable to the character they are portraying</li> <li>about stage sets and more advanced theater terminology</li> <li>to apply their acquired theater skills by attending performances at local theaters, assemblies, and view performances on film</li> </ul>
<p><b>The Arts:</b>  <b>Dance:</b></p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>to focus on the study and performance of multicultural dances</li> <li>more complex dances, including historical and cultural importance of the dances</li> <li>to explore improvisational and expressive movement and attend performance that incorporate multicultural dance</li> </ul>	<p><b>The Arts:</b>  <b>Visual Arts:</b></p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>to expand their talents and techniques from second grade and utilize varied media to recreate their impressions of scenes from their lives</li> <li>to do three-dimensional projects and view artworks by artists of many cultures and discuss the differences and commonalities in the works</li> <li>to explore the world around them through an artistic lens by developing a greater appreciation for nature and artists throughout time and across cultures</li> <li>to display their work and visit museums</li> </ul>
